

FROM THE PASTOR




FEBRUARY 2016

My message at worship on January 30-31 about God's call to Jeremiah to lead his people stressed the importance of his upbringing and his background. Jeremiah was a descendant of one of the chief priests for King David and he was from the small tribe of Benjamin. I highlighted that it took the whole small tribe of Benjamin to rise up their new leader Jeremiah.

We have a small tribe called Zion and we are called by God to invest in our young children and youth to rise up leaders for Jesus. We engage in this leadership process by getting involved with our youth not just with the ones of our age. We can do this by listening to our youth attentively and asking questions like "How can our Tribe at Zion help you feel important in ministry?" Or ask them what the Tribe of Zion can do to improve our ministry and mission?" Another suggestion would be to go to one of their youth events at school or outside activities. The tribe that shows they care about each other grows together.

The small Tribe of Benjamin had a major influence in the call of Jeremiah to be a prophet. The Tribe of Benjamin created an environment that was conducive for Jeremiah to learn and grow in his faith. It took the whole town or tribe to create this climate for leadership in the youth. I pray that the Tribe of Zion is learning, growing and enhancing an environment for our youth to become leaders from the Tribe of Zion.







One way Zion responded to Pastor Glawe's question "How can our Tribe of Zion help youth feel important in ministry" was surely the recent "Musical Gifts of Zion" concert in which Zion youth were encouraged to share their musical talents. A proud day in Zion's history.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION - January 19

In attendance were Melinda Schall, Jennifer Kauffmann and Jackie Glawe. Absent were Heidi Coppock and Susan Pytell.

We reviewed that Preschool through 8th grade continues to follow the Kingdom Quest curriculum. Jackie asked for new ideas for the high school class for the second Sunday of the month due to the Grounds for Pleasure Coffee shop has changed their open time on Sundays to 11:00am. We discussed that last Sunday Terri provided a Hot Chocolate Bar and the youth continued to use the Coffee shop devotional "Ignite Your Faith" and that seemed to work well. Jackie said going to Sam & Ethel's was suggested however time may not allow. Melinda suggested going to Frisches since they have the breakfast bar. We will continue to take ideas and discuss them further in the future.

Youth Night for Dec. was Project Believe. We had 8 youth and 4 adults attend. Jackie will look into if they need help on the other holidays. WORSHIP AND MUSIC – Jan 6

In attendance were Marianne Barnhart, Pastor Glawe, Bill Jones, Deb Keppel, Lil Nichols, and Lori Sebastian.

Pastor began our meeting in prayer. We reviewed Christmas Eve services. Music, choir anthem all went well. The sanctuary was really brightened by the Chrismon tree, poinsettias, and manger scene. One note for next year was to monitor attendance since this year the 7:30PM service (over 150 people) was much better attended than the 10PM service (approx.. 64 people).

During Epiphany, we will move the opening hymn immediately after the sharing of the peace and add the Gloria back in. We will also add the Lord, Now You Let Your Servant go in Peace as the Post Communion Canticle. During Lent, we will switch to Setting 3 and return to the chanted Lord, Have Mercy. We discussed Ash Wednesday and Holy Week. Marianne will take care of ashes, palms, and lilies. We also decided to offer two Ash Wednesday services — 11AM

and 7PM. Ash Wednesday is Feb. 10th and Easter

Sunday is March 27th.

We talked about additional microphones and speakers that someone is willing to donate to the church. Bill suggested we put a couple unidirectional microphones on our "wish list" to help amplify the choir. Bill continues to map out new repertoire for the choir. January he will focus on hymns. Lori stated we will try to have bells or chimes for special music towards the end of Epiphany if schedules permit.

The approximate total in the organ fund is around \$4,000. The January concert will add to that fund. We hope to continue to raise money to put towards the purchase of a new organ, as the existing organ is becoming more difficult to service / find parts for.
