#### A Place for Healing



"Enter into the church and wash away your sins. For there is a hospital for sinners and not a court of law."- St. John Chrysostom (Bishop of Constantinople, 407 AD)

These words from St. John Chrysostom, whose feast day was on September 13, capture the heart of the church's mission. I referenced this quote when I gave the first sermon in last month's evangelism sermon series— "What is evangelism?" I had so many folks approach me about this analogy that I thought I would devote an entire article towards it.

What is the church? What is our mission? Some people see the church as a courtroom. It is a place for judgement. When you walk through those doors Jesus sits up front and condemns you for everything you have done. Church is a place to remind us over and over again about this judgement. "You are nothing but a criminal, a low life! Look what God had to do to put up with your failures! Sure, I guess God forgives you, but he really doesn't want to. It's actually quite inconvenient for him." I know plenty have experienced church to be this way. I know I have.

Others see church as a social club. Folks of a particular background gather together, go through the service, and then leave without a thought about God. When God does enter the picture, it's usually to prompt folks to socialize more or, at the very most, donate to charity. God is not so much someone we relate to but rather a party planner who tells us to get together just because.


These two perspectives of the church are quite prevalent in our culture here in the U.S. We see them on TV, on social media, if not in our own community. And yet, I think they fundamentally miss the point.

The church is a hospital. It's a place for healing. All are welcome to come through these doors and place their burdens, their pain, their suffering, their guilt, their shameeverything that's broken, at the foot of the cross. For at the foot of the foot of the cross we see nothing but God's love for humanity— God's desire that each and every one of us may find fulfillment in our Creator in whose image we have been made.

Zion is a place devoted specifically to healing, as all churches are called to be. For it is here, week in and week out, that we receive the forgiveness of sin. We are continually reminded of God's faithful promises through the waters of baptism, through Holy Communion, through the preaching of the Gospel. At Zion, we share each other's burdens, we celebrate each other's blessings, we point out where we see God in our lives and in the lives of others. This is a ministry of mutual consolation. We walk with each other through the ups and downs of life, constantly pointing to the One in whose promises we rest. The promise of the Gospel is a promise of healing— not necessarily from physical ailments (though that does occur sometimes) but rather from the brokenness of the world around us. We are healed from the guilt and shame we carry in our back pockets, from the burdens that weigh on our backs and beat us down, from sin that holds us in bondage. The church is the only place in the world that provides such healing week in and week out. It is the sole mission of the church.

Zion is a community where all are welcome, where all are accepted, to encounter Christ. Through the sacraments, through the preaching of the Word, through the community God has gathered here all may find healing. Don't get me wrong, we recognize our shortcomings, we admit our faults, we share our shame and anxiety. And yet, God's love, God's grace, God's forgiveness overcomes everything. There is Nothing we can lay at the foot of the cross that Jesus will not pick up himself. And in doing so, we are healed. Thanks be to God!



#### **How Can I Get Involved?**

We are so happy to welcome new people to our congregation. We've been asked about ways to plug in to activities. To provide information about the multitude of opportunities, this is the third of a new ongoing section in Tidings, which describes a specific ministry area and ways to become involved. This month we are highlighting **Caring Creations.** 

As you walk from the Walnut Street entrance to the sanctuary, you have hopefully noticed a table on the right with a sign above it labeled "Caring Creations". There are multiple ways to become involved in these outreach ministries.

#### **Prayer Shawl & Baby Blankets:**

The Prayer Shawl Ministry team makes and delivers prayer shawls to people who have had surgery, who are going through a serious illness such as cancer, or are just going through a difficult time. They are a way to let the person know we care about them and that God loves them and is with them. We also make and deliver baby blankets to new babies.

There are 3 ways you can participate in this ministry.

- 1. Knit, crochet, or sew shawls or baby blankets. You will be given a handbook which has guidelines and patterns for making the shawls. We have lots of yarn that has been donated for making the shawls, but you will need to have your own needles or hooks.
- 2. If you like to visit people, you could deliver shawls and baby blankets. Our handbook has guidelines for delivering them.
- 3. Do you know someone who needs a physical reminder of God's love? Let us know. If they are a member, our team will deliver it. If you want a shawl for a friend or family member who is not part of Zion, we will give it to you and explain what you need to do.

We reviewed several items. We have Saturday evening service covered with internal musicians through the end of 2025. To conclude the meeting, we discussed a couple of remaining details. Zion has secured Adena Brass for the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration (9/13/2026). For technology, remote worship, and live streaming, the finish line is in sight – as they need to run a few more wires (under the sanctuary). # **Council Meeting Report**

#### September 9, 2025

The September 9th Council Meeting brought thoughtful updates, exciting plans, and continued momentum across several areas of church life. From mission outreach to property improvements, each report reflected the dedication and care of our committees and congregation. Below are a few key highlights that capture the spirit and progress of our shared work.

The Council Meeting, members shared heartfelt enthusiasm about a proposed Mission Trip to Biloxi, Mississippi, scheduled for May 10–16, 2026, in partnership with Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. The trip will be coordinated through Back Bay Mission, a deeply rooted organization founded in 1922 as an outreach to the "fisher folk" of Biloxi. Over the past century, Back Bay Mission has grown into a beacon of justice and compassion on the Gulf Coast, offering emergency assistance, housing support, educational programs, and volunteer opportunities that embody the inclusive spirit of the United Church of Christ. This collaboration promises not only hands-on service but also a chance to deepen relationships across congregations and communities. A planning and interest meeting for potential participants will be held on September 28th, inviting all who feel called to serve, learn, and grow together in mission.

#### October Musician's Corner - By Grace We Have Been Saved

When we select hymns for the congregation to sing, we look at the season we are currently in. Then, we review the Scriptures that are designated for the service. The ELCA church makes planning easier because Augsburg Fortress publishes a book called "Sundays and Seasons" that suggests a multitude of hymns and other musical selections that go with the readings for each service. As an example, I always like to pick *Earth and All Stars* sometime in late August or early September (because it talks about classroom and school activities). Similarly, when Pastor recently gave his sermon on Stewardship, we selected hymns that were related to Stewardship (*Will You Come and Follow Me?* – September's hymn of the month – well covered that topic).

For Reformation (and October), I wondered if we should pick a 500-year-old Luther hymn, or something more modern? Luther has a plethora of texts and tunes in our ELW hymnal (*A Mighty Fortress* is likely the most popular), but many of the Luther hymns are German chorales, which can be more challenging to sing. I reviewed several ideas and decided to go with a text that I thought best represented Luther and the Reformation ideals. The hymn of the month for October is *By Grace We Have Been Saved*, #1006 in the All Creation Sings (ACS) hymnal. The refrain states: "By grace we have been saved – saved by grace through faith, not because of what we do, it is the gift of God." That text is straight out of the Scripture in Ephesians 2:8-9 (NSRV – UE): <sup>8</sup> For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— <sup>9</sup> not the result of works, so that no one may boast.

The text of *By Grace We Have Been Saved* was written by Jonathan Rundman. Rundman, a third-generation church musician, was born in Michigan and since 2002 resides in Minnesota. A composer, performer, and recording artist, Rundman created A Heartland Liturgy, graduated from Luther Seminary in 2022, and currently serves as a Pastor of Worship and Music at a Lutheran congregation in Prior Lake, MN. Two songs he has written appear in All Creation Sings (the other is *For Such a Time as This* – ACS 1003); he has also written songs used by regional and national youth gatherings and teaches about liturgy and music. Rundman composed this song along with Nathan Houge. Houge describes himself as a garage folk singer. 
# The Amazing Annual Garage Sale
