## "Serving Christ through Serving Others"

#### 1700 Years of the Nicene Creed

Next year, Zion will be celebrating its 200th anniversary. But before we jump into such a grand celebration, did you know that 2025 is also a significant anniversary—not just for us, but for Christians worldwide? In 2025, Christians around the world are celebrating the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed. At Zion, we tend to regularly recite the Apostles' Creed in worship while saving the Nicene Creed for High Holy Days such as Christmas Eve and Easter. But this doesn't mean the Nicene Creed is less valuable than the Apostles' Creed. Actually, for global Christianity, the Nicene Creed takes precedence. This is because the Nicene Creed articulates the content of our shared faith as it has been received today from Jesus, his apostles, and the early church all the way to now.

In 325 AD, the first ecumenical council was held in the village of Nicaea in what is modern-day Turkey. Nicaea is known as an "ecumenical council" because it included bishops and representatives from all corners of Christ's Church as it then existed. It was a gathering of the whole Church. At the time, Christians were engaged in a fierce debate over whether Jesus was truly God incarnate or whether Jesus was a created being just like us, albeit with more powers than you and me. The Church was being torn apart. And so a Council was called to meet in Nicaea in order to resolve this debate. The council was ultimately a success. The Council of Nicaea produced the Nicene Creed which affirmed that Jesus is *both* God and man.

As Lutherans, we affirm the faith that has been passed down to us from Jesus to the apostles and beyond as articulated in the words of the Nicene Creed. This isn't because the Church is infallible, but because the Nicene Creed points us to Christ. It offers a clarity which allows us to summarize the heart of Scripture— pointing us to the Triune God who loves His creation and is at work redeeming this world from death, sin, and the Devil. Even more importantly, the Nicene Creed leads us to preach Christ, crucified and risen, so that all who hear may know the love of God through Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh.

As I mentioned above, this isn't just a creed for Lutherans. It is a creed that brings all Christians together around the world, across church bodies and theological differences. The Nicene Creed is the beating heart, the very foundation, of Christian faith. By professing the Nicene Creed, we as Lutherans are joined to our brothers and sisters across the world—Anglicans/Episcopalians, Presbyterians, Roman Catholics, Eastern Orthodox, Dutch Calvinists, Methodists, and many others. We share a common faith, even if we have disagreements at the margins. What a glorious witness to the unity Christ provides through his Church, that even in the midst of our differences, we can unite around a shared articulation of the faith—centered on the Triune God revealed in Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father, who was sent to free us from death, sin, and the Devil through his life, death, resurrection and who promised his Church the presence of the Holy Spirit who comforts us, teaches us, and empowers us to preach the Gospel to all the world. What a blessing. Thanks be to God!



#### How to Help Make a Quilt

If you haven't seen the Quilting Room on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor, check it out. It's amazing!!

Do you want to make a quilt yourself, OR be a team member? Some choose to work at home on quilting tasks. Do as much as you want.



- Cut fabric into 11-inch squares
- Cut fabric into 6-inch squares
- Tie knots
- Lay out a design with the squares
- Final step sewing around the 4 sides of the quilt
- Donate fabric (cotton)
- Donate embroidery floss
- Donate used bed sheets (in good condition)
- Donate money for supplies
- Donate your time on Monday or Tuesday mornings

On the job training is provided.

The quilts are sent to Lutheran World Relief for victims of disaster.

## **Worship and Music Committee Meeting**

The Worship and Music Committee met on Wednesday, October 22<sup>nd</sup>. Attending were: Carla Frame, Bill Jones, Dep Keppel, Lori Sebastian, and Pastor Jaren Summers. We discussed the Saturday evening service, coverage for November 9<sup>th</sup>, and the past funerals.

Upcoming service days include: (a) All Saints Day – November 1/2, (b) Advent begins November 29/30, and (c) Christmas Eve falls on Wednesday, December 24 – there will be one 7pm service.

For liturgy and hymns, we discussed transitioning from Setting 2 to Setting 1 in Advent. Advent will have some reflective liturgy. In lieu of the Kyrie/Hymn of Praise, we will sing *Light One Candle* – Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW) 240. *O Come, O Come Emmanuel* (vs. 1 and 7) will be the Gospel Acclamation. *Create in Me* will become the Offertory Canticle, and the Prayer of Hippolytus (with inserted Words of Institution) will cover the communion liturgy. The hymn of the month has been well received. In November, we will use a syncopated Asian tune (NYANYIKANLAH NYANYIAN BARU) or *Hallelujah! Sing Praise to Your Creator* (All Creation Sings 1091). In December, we will use a Swedish folk tune (HAF TRONES LAMPA FÄRDIG) with the text *Rejoice, Rejoice, Believers* (ELW 244).

Pastor provided updates for the NRSV-UE (New Revised Standard Version – Updated Edition) – mentioning through the end of October, they are available for \$42 to order. He also handed out an article with additional information about the translation.

Bill continues to look ahead for the vocal choir schedule. We will sing 2 Sundays in Advent, Christmas Eve, and then have the month of January off. Ash Wednesday falls on February 18<sup>th</sup> with Easter on April 5<sup>th</sup>. We will plan for other special music during January (possibly bells, guitar, or another instrument).

Lori plans for the bell choir to ring during Advent, if schedules permit, and then once during the Epiphany season.

Carla indicated altar was running smoothly and there were no further updates. Pastor and she discussed how Communion at the rail would work (Sundays only) during the advent season. Deb mentioned decorating the sanctuary for Advent and Christmas in late November.

For technology, remote worship, and live streaming, the camera has moved upstairs. Pastor stated that they are hoping to run wire (and make things more permanent) in January 2026.

Our next meeting date is January 14, 2026 at 6:00 pm.

## November Musician's Corner - Hallelujah! Sing Praise to Your Creator

The November hymn of the month *Hallelujah!* Sing Praise to Your Creator is found in the new hymnal supplement <u>All Creation Sings</u> (ACS) 1091. It is one of a handful of Asian tunes included in our (American) Lutheran hymnody. The text was written by Tilly Lubis (1925-2002) – who was an Indonesian Christian poet and hymn writer. There is little other biographical information available. The hymn was translated into English by David Diephouse, who was educated at Calvin College, then received his masters and doctorate at Princeton University. Diephouse spent most of his career teaching and researching the role of religion in German society and culture in the 1700-1900s.

The tune for ACS 1091 is an Indonesian Batak melody. This melody originated from the Batak people of North Sumatra, Indonesia. Missionaries from various Christian faith traditions (Baptist, Calvinist and Lutheran) spread the Gospel in this North Sumatra region in the mid-1800s. Batak melodies are characterized by a strong melody line, drums, gongs, and a wind or reed instrument. Instruments like the gendang, taganing, and serune kale are sometimes used (pictured below). During college at the University of Dayton, our oldest daughter participated in a Javanese (musical – and all percussion) ensemble group. This group likely played instruments similar to those used by the Batak people. When we sing this tune, you will notice a strong beat and some syncopation.
